






Experiences of our City NTE








Survey - Women's feelings of safety within Norwich's night time economy

Of the 65 females spoken to, only 9 said that they felt safe


86% of females felt unsafe or unsure of their safety

43 of the 65 females felt intimidated, harassed or had been assaulted in the NTE

What we do...

- Proactively identify those displaying predatory sexual behaviour within our NTE
- Plain clothed and uniformed assets to detect, disrupt and process sexual predators
- 2 x plain clothed Behavioural Detection Officers working with double crewed uniformed units to identify and engage with suspects
- Work with intelligence units and safeguarding teams building an intelligence picture around potential offenders and safeguard vulnerable members of the public





What we are looking to achieve...

- Safeguard members of the public
- Gather intelligence to disrupt perpetrators
- Support potential vulnerable people
- Identify missing adults and young people
- Reduction in sexual offences in the night-time economy
- Increased trust and confidence in the police
- Smarter, intelligence-led working practices

Launch – White Ribbon Day 2024...

- First patrols conducted in Norwich 31st October 2024, focusing on PoW Road, Queen St, London St.
- Reporting form created and weekly Risk Management meetings arranged
- PSP created to support Project Vigilant patrols
- Internal and external comms launched (White Ribbon Day).
- Survey on feelings of safety in NTE drafted and reviewed, then released and publicised.





...and through 2025

- Meetings with SARC, TYSS and other key partners
- Patrols expanded to new locations
- Engagement with venues, hotels, and public transport providers.
- More regular patrols
- Focussed patrols at events and busier periods
- Joint patrols with the PCC and other partners

A year on, where are we now?

- Conducted 100's of proactive interventions
- 38 individuals (and counting) identified and risk assessed
- Evidence towards 2 Sexual Harm Prevention orders for individuals identified by Vigilant patrols
- 50+ PIR's submitted
- Worked with TYSS to learn about vulnerable young people and identify those we may see in the NTE
- Training now delivered to all 5 neighbourhood response teams





A year on, where are we now?

- Special Constabulary trained
- Safeguarding and support to numerous adult and young females
- Great relationships with partners
- Wristbands and information cards that display key messaging
- Moved from a pilot to more sustainable BAU policing and integration into core policing

An Introduction

DAPPA is a multi-agency approach to addressing domestic abuse within Norfolk which launched in September 2021.

We identify perpetrators, using statistical analysis, who present the most serious or repeated risk of harm. The approach brings together key partners to work effectively to manage perpetrators of domestic abuse and protect the most vulnerable victims, working together to tackle behaviour and break the cycle of abuse.



How do we identify DAPPA Perpetrators?

The majority of perpetrators are identified via the DAPPA analyst using police crime and incident data.

We use a Recency, Frequency, Gravity (RFG) matrix to identify perpetrators who present the most serious or repeated risk of harm.

DAPPA will also consider appropriate referrals from police and partner agencies for perpetrators not scored through this process.



Monthly DAPPA Meetings

The monthly DAPPA meetings are held on Microsoft Teams and:

- Review progress of any live investigations involving the perpetrator
- Review recent intelligence
- Share partner agency information
- Assess the risk posed to the victim(s) and refer for safeguarding support
- Develop actions to manage risk
- Assess any need for multiagency intervention and support
- Agree timescales for action
- Track outcome and compliance of actions agreed



Perpetrator Intervention

- From DAPPA's inception in 2021, DAPPA included a one-to-one perpetrator intervention programme provided by the Change Project. Unfortunately, the Home Office funding for this came to an end in March 2025 and we are unable to offer perpetrators a structured intervention programme.
- In the absence of the Change Project, DAPPA Officers will refer perpetrators to statutory agencies for other forms of support, looking at offending in a holistic way



DAPPA Outcomes

- 38.2% reduction in RFG score between being on the cohort and the six subsequent months, 54.5% in twelve subsequent months, 61.1% in eighteen months
- 23.5% had not reoffended since being on the cohort, 38.8% had not reoffended with a serious violence crime, 34.7% had not reoffended with a DA-related crime
- Cost of crime per perpetrator on average was £4,018 per perpetrator per month, reduced to £1,581 after leaving the cohort saving of £2,437 on average per perpetrator per month.
- One nominal reduced from £17,665 to £3,263 per month



Case Study 1

- Perpetrator came to DAPPA attention in May 2025 after he had breached several DVPOs and repeatedly assaulted on/off partner a vulnerable female.
- Victim had made disclosures to her mum but there were difficulties in her engagement with police colleagues to substantiate the report.
- DAPPA meeting held with significant number of agencies and attendees present.
- Op Engage police team and DAPPA team worked closely to support victim engagement.
- DAPPA engaged directly with housing to make current property safe for victim and then source alternative accommodation. DAPPA worked closely with Probation to secure accommodation for perpetrator away from victim with stringent licence conditions. We also highlighted care and support needs of the perpetrator with Adult Social Care to reduce reliance on the victim. We also worked with housing for the perpetrator, and he was assessed for his own longer-term accommodation, in addition to work with CGL to address substance misuse.
- Police continue to work on a Criminal Behaviour Order for the perpetrator which would ban him from contact with the victim, exclude him from specific areas and require him to engage with services to address his behaviour and substance misuse issues.
- Use of both diversionary and disruptive tactics to problem solve effectively

Case Study 2

- Perpetrator was initially adopted as a DAPPA case in November 2024 and DAPPA worked intensively with him
 for 8 months.
- He was adopted as the DA perpetrator against his partner but over the course of his time on DAPPA it became clear there were definite crossovers where at times the reported victim was exhibiting signs of stalking and controlling and coercive behaviour. This made investigation and management of risk very difficult.
- Housing authorities were already involved in the case regarding anti-social behaviour and evidence from their case was used to identify and clarify areas of risk and behaviour from both parties.
- Joint work completed between various police teams regarding safety for both parties and reducing impact of an unhealthy relationship for both.
- A Community Protection Warning was issued which prevented the victim from attending the perpetrator's address. This reduced risk to both parties and gave enforcement powers to police to remove her if she was found at the location. This also reduced impact on neighbours.
- Support was offered to both parties to increase independence away from the relationship and reduce likelihood
 of her attending the address.
